Language Program News by Giuseppe Tassone

Italian Language Program Director

The Italian Language Program offers classes in fall, winter, and spring. Classes are held at Seattle University in the Administration Building. Class fee is \$180 per quarter unless indicated otherwise in the class description.

Fall Quarter 2013: October 1st - December 10th Pre-registration Deadline: September 27th

Winter Quarter 2014: January 7th - March 13th Pre-registration deadline: December 28th

Spring Quarter 2014: April 2nd - June 6th Pre-registration Deadline: March 22nd

Classes Offered:

Beginning Italian (Level A1) - For people with little or no Italian language. Students will be introduced to the basic phonetic, grammatical, and lexical structures through conversation and simple dialogues. Held Tuesday and Thursdays from 7:00 to 8:30 pm.

Elementary Italian (Level A2) - This is the continuation of the beginning class or for those who have already studied some Italian. Students will become familiar with more difficult grammar structures. Held Tuesday and Thursdays from 7:00 to 8:30 pm.

Intermediate Level (B1, B2) - B1 reviews grammar covered in the previous levels; B2 is the continuation of B1. Both are mainly conversation -based to expand students' vocabulary and increase their ability to understand newspapers, magazines, and literature. Classes are conducted entirely in Italian. Held Tuesday and Thursdays from 7:00 to 8:30 pm.

Additional Classes - Additional levels of Italian (C1, C2), Italian for Travelers (An introductory class for people planning a trip to Italy or for those who want to learn some Italian in one quarter), or Italian for Children courses can be scheduled for groups of at least 8. Class fee, location, and schedule may vary based on the request and number of students. To organize a class, please contact the director at least 30 days before the beginning of the requested quarter. Contact Giuseppe Tassone at tassone@danteseattle.org or call 425-243-7663.

PLIDA

PLIDA (Progetto Lingua Italiana Dante Alighieri)

The Dante Alighieri Society of Washington in Seattle is an official examination center of the Società Dante Alighieri and provides its students and others the opportunity of taking PLIDA exams in order to obtain a PLIDA certificate.

The PLIDA Certificate

The PLIDA certificate is an official Diploma issued by the Società Dante Alighieri under an agreement with the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the University of Rome *La Sapienza*. It is recognized by the Italian Ministry of Labour and Social Policies and by the Italian Ministry of University and Research as a qualification for the proficiency in the Italian language for foreigners.

The PLIDA certificates attest proficiency in Italian as a foreign language on a 6-level scale according to the parameters established by the Common European Framework for Languages (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2).

Why Take the PLIDA Exam

Students who may wish to be certified include those who plan to study at Italian universities (which accepts PLIDA Certification as proof of proficiency), American high school and college students who may seek college credit, or persons wishing to be certified for obtaining an application for the Italian Permit of Stay in Italy. Certification may also interest students who see the examination as a capstone experience after taking their language courses.

Dates, Registration, Location, and Exam Fees

PLIDA certificate sessions (Levels A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2) will be held every year in May and November. Candidates may choose to take an exam at the level they feel is closest to their proficiency. Registration does not require having taken lower-level tests.

Candidates need to register approximately 30 days prior to the exam date. Exams are held at Seattle University. For further information and more on the dates of each exam, registration deadlines, location, exam fees, and registration instructions check the Language School's Plida website at:





Book Review

Don't Sing at the Table: Life Lessons from My Italian Grandmothers by Adriana Trigiani

hen I was given this slim gem from a 1st generation German friend, she said it reminded her of our mothers, but belonged in my family library. Along with Trigiani's grandmothers, Lucia and Viola, our mothers, born in 1911,



depicted characteristics apparent in women of that era—strength of character and identity, comfortable with who they were, and proud of their heritage. Lucia and Viola began their working years as teens, in the garment factories of NY & NJ.

Lucia was widowed with three children, at a young age, shortly after WWI, and only a few years after moving to a small Minnesota town. The US Government provided an opportunity for families, and the custom cobbler anticipated a thriving business that would lead back to New York markets. Lucia was a fine seamstress, but soon developed into couture, the art of high fashion.

Viola married a man who also worked in the garment industry. After a few years, they began their own small factory, tailoring blouses for high end NY fashion stores. Eventually, the business grew to include 50 employees. Their lives were more comfortable, but surviving the Great Depression and the war years was a challenge for everyone.

Adriana was able to spend time with her grandmothers, even though distance divided them. And she listened to all they could teach her! The title of the book comes from a list of adages the grandmas counseled—you will have to read the book to learn the meaning of <u>Don't Sing at the Table</u>. In our family, I heard that a lot, from both Mother Filomena Fiorito Picardo and Grandma Angela DiLiello Fiorito! (My brother noted that these grandmothers sound like they lived in OUR dining room). My hardback copy is making the rounds of my family—if they have yet to buy their own copy!

Three to four generations of you will relate the memoir to your own growing-up-years. My own grandchildren still talk about their great-grandma's love and caring when they were young. (Oldest grandson lucky enough to spend time in his first year with his great-great grandma). More importantly, this book was the stepping-off point for me into many more of Adriana Trigiani's work—which my German friend has already read. Most of her books were written BEFORE this one, but as I read them, they ALL take their themes taken from the lives of all four grandparents. There are three trilogies among the books, and as my friend recommended, so do I: read them in order: Big Stone Gap is the first, followed by Big Cherry Holler, and Milk Glass Moon. I have been collecting the books as I find them—even used copies intermingled with new in one of the bookstores I patronize. Check out her website for much more about her: www.adrainatrigiani.com

The café provides a way for people living with dementia and their friends and family to have the simple yet meaningful experience of connecting with others and enjoying a tasty treat in a community setting. In this model, a restaurant or café sets aside a particular time to especially welcome people living with dementia—with a simplified menu and staff who are aware of the customers' special needs. Il Palazzetto in Umbria: A Unique Medieval Retreat

In February last year Cam and I along with Pio, a very good friend from Pisa, went to Gubbio to visit another dear old friend and IBM colleague, Alfredo Brofferio, or Feo, and his wife Nicoletta.

Gubbio, at 522 m of altitude, is a "special" old town in Umbria. It is "the most beautiful medieval town in Italy" according to the local people. By the way and FYI, the old center of Genova is instead the largest medieval town in Italy.

Gubbio is famous also for the "balestra" (crossbow) and for the annual "Palio della Balestra" (Crossbow Tournament), which takes place every year the last Sunday of May.

Feo lives in a wonderful **medieval palace** in the center of the town. The building is very old, with large rooms, all richly furbished. Entering in it, you feel to enter in a world of centuries ago, peopled by dames and musketeers. But at the same time you will find most of the comforts of the modern life!

Our bedroom was the largest Cam and I have ever slept in. From the picture, and knowing that our bed was a king-size double bed, you can have a rough idea of how large our room was!

In addition to the medieval palace, Feo and Nicoletta own a very unique kind of "agriturismo" not far from the Center of Gubbio. You need a car to reach it, and with Feo's car we went there to visit the resort and enjoyed the splendid view of the Umbria countryside which is a triumph of green, shadowy woods, and

sunny weather, mainly in summer!

The resort, called "Il Palazzetto" is situated in the hills surrounding Gubbio, 8 km from the village of Padule, which is at about 5 km south east of Gubbio. A smooth country road leads you there in less than half hour, through over 2000 hectares of woodland and pasture.

Il Palazzetto consists of a few apartments, modernly restructured in an old farm of Feo's family, completely isolated from other farm houses. The farm house is thought to date from the end of the eighteenth century, although through the ages it has undergone various renovations that brought its conversion into independent apartments, each one with autonomous central heating, functional furnishings accommodating twenty guests.

We visited all the apartments, all very nice and independent one from the other. You can live together with other people and families, without any conflict and with a complete feeling of privacy. Around the agriturismo we saw a trail with red marks and signs of CAI. You have the choice to go walking and enjoy the adventure of your discoveries.

The Palazzetto, as well as Gubbio, could be considered also as the base for excursions to the most renowned towns of Umbria, like Perugia, Seattle's sister city, 40 from Padule, Assisi (50 km), Spoleto (87 km), with all its valuable monuments and our friends of the CAI section, Todi (81 km) and of the Province of Pesaro Urbino, like Urbino itself at about 64 Km. Urbino is the birth place of the famous Raffaello (1483-1520 Roma).

During our few days in Gubbio, we had also the chance to visit an unusual and unique museum, the so-called "Gilded Bronzes" from Cartaceto of Pergola, in the Province of Pesaro Urbino. There, you can enjoy the only group of gilded bronzes, still in existence in the world, dating from ancient Roman times. Pergola is at a little more than 47 km from Gubbio.

Additional information about Alfredo. He comes from a noble family of Gubbio, and from his ancestors he inherited, in addition to the Palace in Gubbio, the title of Marquis!










Figure 1 – Crossbow, from a drawing of Leonardo Figure 2 – Palio della Balestra


