# Language Program News by Giuseppe Tassone

Italian Language Program Director

The 2012-13 Italian Language Program of the Dante Alighieri Society of Washington started on October  $2^{nd}$  with 63 students enrolled.

Starting this year we have changed the structure of our classes to better respond to the standards of the PLIDA (Progetto Lingua Italiana Dante Alighieri) Italian language proficiency certification. Following the Common European Framework of Reference, we divided our classes into 3 levels: A1 *Beginning Italian*, A2 *Elementary Italian* and B1 *Intermediate Italian*.

Currently, we have 16 students enrolled in level A2 and 19 in level B1 so it is very likely next year we will add level B2 *Fundamental Italian* if most of the current B1 students continue with their studies.

If any of our students are interested in receiving a certificate attesting his/her level of Italian, the Italian Language Program of the Dante Alighieri Society of Washington offers PLIDA exams in May and November at Seattle University.

Knowledgeable and qualified instructors with many years of experience in our program teach our classes. This year Daniel Zanchi (Level A1) and Laura Ciroi (Level B1) are celebrating ten years of commitment in our program. To Daniel, Laura, and Michela Tartaglia (Level A2) go my gratitude for their hard work and dedication. Their contribution help me to continue running a successful program and give the joy of learning Italian to hundreds of students every year.

Students praise our program not only for the quality but also for the informal setting and friendly atmosphere in the classroom that enable them to make progress and attend class regularly even after a day of work. Our classes meet at 7:00 p.m.!

In addition to their language instruction, our students are invited to participate in cultural events and lectures related to Italy presented by the *Dante Alighieri Society of Washington* and other institutions such as *Seattle University* – *Modern Languages and Cultures*, the *University of Washington* – *Italian Board* and the *Seattle-Perugia Sister City Association*. The Dante Alighieri of Washington is once again a sponsor of the New Italian Film Festival at SIFF. Our students traditionally attend the Festival and discuss the films in class.

Although our program began in the fall and ends in June, if anyone is interested they can contact me to be placed in the appropriate level. The next quarter starts Thursday, January 8th. Registration deadline is December 21<sup>st</sup>.

The Dante Alighieri of Washington Italian Language Program is a nonprofit self-sustaining program operating exclusively with the income from the tuition and the generosity of Seattle University that is hosting our classes.

## **PLIDA**

**P**LIDA (Progetto Lingua Italiana Dante Alighieri)

The Dante Alighieri Society of Washington in Seattle is an official examination center of the Società Dante Alighieri and provides its students and others the opportunity of taking PLIDA exams in order to obtain a PLIDA certificate.

#### The PLIDA Certificate

The PLIDA certificate is an official Diploma issued by the Società Dante Alighieri under an agreement with the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the University of Rome *La Sapienza*. It is recognized by the Italian Ministry of Labour and Social Policies and by the Italian Ministry of University and Research as a qualification for the profiency in the Italian language for foreigners.

The PLIDA certificates attest proficiency in Italian as a foreign language on a 6-level scale according to the parameters established by the Common European Framework for Languages (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2).

#### Why Take the PLIDA Exam

Students who may wish to be certified include those who plan to study at Italian universities (which accepts PLIDA Certification as proof of proficiency), American high school and college students who may seek college credit, or persons wishing to be certified for obtaining an application for the Italian Permit of Stay in Italy. Certification may also interest students who see the examination as a capstone experience after taking their language courses.

#### Dates, Registration, Location, and Exam Fees

PLIDA certificate sessions will be held every year in May and November. Candidates may choose to take an exam at the level they feel is closest to their proficiency. Registration does not require having taken lower-level tests.

Candidates need to register approximately 30 days prior to the exam date. Dates for the 2012 exams are November 29th (Levels A1, A2, B1) and November 30th (Levels B2, C1, C2) with registration due no later than November 8th. Exams are held at Seattle University. The Seattle chapter of the Dante Alighieri Society has published a long-awaited cookbook from Dante members called *La Cucina della Dante*.



Have you missed going to Seattle Opera to see a live performance? Seattle is fortunate to have a very vibrant world class



opera house attracting world renowned opera stars. Last year, we conducted a survey of what members might be like to pursue and there was interest in attending live opera, specifically Italian opera. DAS is investigating group sales for selected performances throughout the year. If 10 or more people are interested, we would be able to purchase tickets at a 15% discount. The only way to obtain a bigger discount is to line up about 2 hours before the opera begins for "rush" tickets – available to seniors over 65. ID required. However, there is usually only a small number of tickets and a large crowd of seniors wanting them.

Individually, a limited number of discounted subscriptions are available for Students and Seniors. To quote from the Seattle Opera website regarding discounts, "Seniors over 65 qualify for discounts by subscribing to the Orchestra Back (OB) or First Tier Side (FTS). Plus discounts are available in every section at McCaw Hall on the Friday/Saturday mixed series. Discounts are available off single tickets. ID required."

Group discounts may be had for Wednesday night and Sunday matinees. Every effort is made to seat the group together. Popular operas can be a little pricier. For instance, Fidelio which is currently running would be 43.00 - 145.00. La Boheme, which will be offered from February 23 – March  $10^{\text{th}}$ , 2013 would range from 51.00 - 185.00. Those lowest priced seats are dependent on whatever is available.

Pre-performance lectures are \$7.00 per ticket.

The Seattle Opera Schedule for the rest of the year is Cinderella, or *LaCenerentola* (Rossini) January 12 –Jan 26, 2013, La Boheme, (Puccini) February 23- March 10, 2013 and La Voix Humaine (Poulenc) & Suor Angelica (Puccini), May 4 – 18, 2013.

There are people within our organization who are taking advantage of the Metropolitan Opera HD films that can be viewed at local theatres for about \$20.00 and they are very happy with those selections. However, watching a live performance at Seattle Opera is unparalleled and is a fine way to support the local arts and to ensure that we continue to have an opera that is recognized the world over.

For the Metropolitan HD Opera Schedule, please check the online site at www. Metropolitanopera.org. Theatres range from Tacoma to Burlington, Washington, while local Seattle theatres are at Kent Station, Oak Tree, Pacific Place 11, and Southcenter 16.

#### FESTA DI NATALE

Our annual Christmas party took place on Saturday, December 6, 1986 at the Social Hall of Our Lade of Mr. Virgin Church. The food was catered by George Pollet who did a marvellous job serving a dianer of mastaccioli, mixed salad, chicken alla cacciators, steamed vegetables, rolls, and coffee. The members had brought a fantastic array of deaserts which were shared by all. Wine and punch was provided by the society.

Reservations had been made for 130 people, and almost all of them actually strended. Special guests were Father O'Callaghan, the perish priost of Mt.Virgin Church, and Professor Pellegrini, the well-known writer and lecturer.

Tony Ferrucci acted as Master of Ceremonies for the evening. Clarissa Szabados told the children the story of the Befana, handed out candy to them and them led them in a candlelight protession to the presepto, which had been lowingly set-up by Sanfra Bordiz. At the presepto, the children mang Christmas carels with the adults joining in.

# **Translation of 1986 Natale Article**

Festa di Natale By Carin Jacroux

# **World on a String**

D eciding to walk rather than taking the walking escalator to one of the gates at Atlanta's airport on a recent flight, Brian and I noticed a display of puppets from around the world. Included were puppets from Italy in a fantastic display called "World on a String" on loan from the Center of Puppetry Arts in Atlanta, GA. These puppets take visitors on a journey though the history and variety of puppetry across the globe. There were 51 puppets from 17 different regions of the world, including not only Italy but China, Cambodia, Mali, Egypt, Indonesia, Belgium, and the United States. With informative displays one could see how the art of puppetry has traveled around the world and across time, including how important Italy was to the development of puppetry.


The majority of puppets in this presentation are from the 20th century with the oldest being the Italian puppet dating 1835. Eleven of the 51 have never been on display.

"We are proud to present this colorful, eye-catching exhibit, which will appeal to all age groups," said Katherine Dirgo, Airport Program manager. "The puppets on display represent some iconic forms of the art, such as Punch and Judy, as well as interesting varieties that may be less familiar, such as water puppetry."

# Italian Puppetry

taly has one of the richest puppetry traditions in the world, with companies collectively embracing virtually all forms of puppetry. Along with the famous Sicilian Opera Dei Pupi figures, smaller traditional marionettes (which inspired Collodi's tale of Pinocchio) are found in many parts of the country. Tales of the emperor Charlemagne and his knights gave birth to the Sicilian Opera dei Pupi theatre. The heroic story cycles, partially improvised and always accompanied by music, could take many months to perform, with a different episode every night.

# Valentinetti Puppet Museum

Marionettes from the Northwest Puppet Center in Seattle. They staged many shows for Festa Italiana and DAS had a program at their theatre in the past. But, were you aware of the Valentinetti Puppet Museum in Bremerton?

Aurora Valentinetti, the founder of Valentinetti Puppeteers, was born in West Seattle in 1921 but her parents were born in Italy, emigrating to America and settling in Seattle where they became active in the local Italian and parish community life.

Aurora received her B.A (1943) and M.A. (1949) degrees from the University of Washington in the School of Drama. She was introduced to the art of puppetry when a fellow student asked her to help her put on a puppet performance when someone backed out. From then on she was hooked!

In the September 2012 edition of "Columns", the University of Washington Alumni Magazine, an article appeared about the Valentinetti Puppet Museum:

Celebrating the 15th anniversary of its founding, the Valentinetti Puppet Museum in Bremerton preserves the legacy of Aurora Valentinetti, '43, '49, and the early founders of the puppetry program in the School of Drama.

Under the direction of Professor Glenn Hughes, the art of puppetry was introduced as an integral part of the drama curriculum in the early 1930s. In 1942-43, as the male members of the department faculty were being drafted for WWII, young Valentinetti was hired to take on the task of teaching puppetry.

For the next 50 years she taught hundreds of students the art and craft of making puppets. Generations of Northwest audiences were introduced to this spectacular art form, first through the University Puppeteers, and later her own company, Valentinetti Puppeteers as well as her own program on KCTS-TV.

In 1993, former drama student, Marshall Campbell, '65, invited Valentinetti to contribute some of her collection to Campbell's emerging Evergreen Children's Theatre in Bremerton. Conceived as a school of drama for children and



introducing them to professional performances of both live actors and puppetry, Campbell further hoped to establish a museum of puppetry.

Now in its third home, the Valentinetti Puppet Museum has grown into a significant showcase of the international art of puppetry. From a core collection provided by Campbell and Valentinetti of 250, the holdings now exceed 1300 items; gifts from local, national and international donors. Three major international gifts, 2 from China and the most recent from Bremerton's Sister City, Kure, Japan establish the museum as a must see institution. Under Stanley Hess's leadership the museum has broken ground in introducing puppet exhibits to audiences in Western Washington from Long Beach, Olympia and Seattle as well as throughout the Kitsap Peninsula.

Valentinetti, who celebrated her 90th birthday in 2011, continues to share her love of puppetry. Help support this legacy so it may continue for many generations to come.


