November English Meeting "The Portrait of Dante, Poet and Pilgrim"

Presented by Beatrice Arduini, UW

Wednesday, November 8th, 6:30 pm Headquarters House



Join Beatrice Arduini, Assistant Professor of Italian and Undergraduate Program Coordinator (Italian) at UW when she presents "The Portrait of Dante, Poet and Pilgrim" for the November 8th English meeting.

She will discuss the visual tradition of Dante up until the time when his portrait was crystallized in the image we associate with the poet today. The earliest pictures that are supposed to represent Dante are found in manuscripts of his Divine Comedy, but the representation of Dante has soon become a cultural

icon and a symbol of ideal linguistic unity which anticipated Italian national unification in the nineteenth century. This ideological function was codified, established, and repeated in fifteenth-century manuscripts, monumental paintings, and sculptures.

Prof. Arduini completed her undergraduate and doctorate degrees at the University of Milan in Italy and received her Ph.D from Indiana University-Bloomington. She centers her work on Medieval Italian literature and Dante Studies, particularly on manuscript culture. She is currently working on her book project, *The Invention of Dante's Convivio*, which examines the tradition of Dante's unfinished treatise in manuscripts and early printed editions.

From the President's Desk

alve a tutti –

The Seattle International Film Festival (SIFF) has their ninth annual Italian film festival – Cinema Italian Style – on November 9th-16th. DAS is a major sponsor of the Festival again this year so check out the schedule at (http://www.siff.net/year-round-cinema/film-festivals/cis-2017). If you go to a few films - I'm sure there are some that will intrigue you, you'll help make the festival a success - and further the mission of the Dante Alighieri Society by promoting Italian culture and arts at the same time.

SIFF shows a number of currently popular Italian films, not otherwise available here in the Northwest. It's a great opportunity to keep up-to-date on things Italian.

Personally, I'm looking forward to seeing the Vittorio De Sica classic, $Umberto\ D$, again. The film is a post-WWII Italian neo-realism masterpiece. De Sica's films are always heartbreaking and compassionate and this is said to be one of his best.

There's also *Naples '44* with narration by Benedict Cumberbatch. The script is taken from the war memoir of the same name by a then young British Intelligence officer, Norman Lewis. The book and the film portray the reaction of the people of Naples to the liberation of their city from Nazi occupation.

And there's romantic and screwball comedies, moving dramas, and "a playful mafia musical" - whatever that is.

As a sponsor, we have a number of complimentary tickets to the showings. They will be available on a first-come, first-serve basis at the November 8th meeting. Just come by then and let me know if you would like one.

We have only one meeting in November, on Wednesday, November 8th, due to the Thanksgiving holiday. Professor Beatrice Arduini, an Associate Professor of Italian at the University of Washington, will give the first of two lectures this program year on Dante in celebration of the 750th anniversary of the birth of Dante in 2016. This is what a UW publication has to say about Professor Arduini's research:

Arduini's research is about the work of Dante Alighieri, the pioneering Italian poet most famous for The Divine Comedy. Dante is a popular topic, but here's where Arduini carves out a niche for herself: She studies one of the poet's unfinished books, The Banquet, and focuses less on the content itself and more on how it was received by people at the time (specifically from 1300 to 1400 A.D. for anyone who's counting). "When Dante became important culturally, there was an interest in his unfinished work because it was politically useful," Arduini said. "I'm studying the shift in that tradition."

Her admiration for Dante is, in a sense, mutual. The poet's work features a character named after his muse: Beatrice. So, come along to our November meeting - learn a little something about our "patron" and pick up your free tickets to the SIFF Cinema Italian Style film festival while they last.

And don't forget to put our annual Festa di Natale per i Bambini on your calendar. It will be held on Saturday, December 2nd from 1:00 to 4:00 pm at Christ the King Church in Seattle. Our Christmas party for kids will introduce members of the younger generation to a number of Italian Christmas traditions: tombola - an Italian family bingo game, pizzelle - Italian wafer cookies made on the spot, the presepio - the Italian creche or manger scene and, of course, La Befana who brings the gifts Italian children get at Christmas time. Spettacolo

n November 3rd and 8th, the Northwest Film Forum (1515 12th Avenue, Seattle) will show *Spettacolo*. In *Spettacolo*, the film-



makers of the acclaimed documentary Marwencol turn their cameras on the residents of Monticchiello, a small, serene town of 136 people on a hill in Tuscany, who for five decades have been performing an annual play of their own lives every summer. Their piazza becomes their stage and villagers from 6 to 90 play a part—the role of themselves, even as their home is trapped in a seemingly inescapable decline. This auto dramatic tradition is imperiled by tourism, "the barbarism of modernity" (as one character puts it), a decline of interest by younger generations, and the gradual passing of the older actors.

Language Program News

Gíuseppe Tassone, Italian Language School Dírector

November is a midterm quarter for our program. Our students started class on Thursday, September 28th and by the time you read this news they will have completed 10 lessons, which means 15 contact hours of Italian. The total number of hours to complete their level is 90 hours. In my last visit to the classes, I had the opportunity to chat with a few students at different levels and I was very happy to hear about their positive experience with our program. In addition, I was amazed to talk with some students in level A1 who had no or little Italian language skills but can now have understanding and can answer simple questions in Italian after such a short period of time. Our philosophy is that learning a language takes time, structure, dedication, and class experience. Students' interaction with their peers and instructor is essential for steady progress and good performance. Below are the profiles of our two new instructors, Federica Gabardi and Tommaso Nencetti.

Federica Gabardi



Federica was born and raised in Milan and she is very fond of her city. She studied Latin and ancient Greek, among other subjects, in high school at the *Collegio San Carlo* of Milan, and after her diploma, she graduated in Political Science from the *Università Cattolica di Milano*. Over the past 15 years Federica, driven by her passion for brand communication, has been working in different marketing and communication roles. In addition, Federica, extending her passion for brand communication and interpersonal communication, began a parallel career as a professional coach. As of today, she is a consultant, coach, and professional trainer in communication, style, and personal branding. Federica loves teaching Italian, sharing her language and bringing alive with her students the Italian style and way of life.

Tommaso Nencetti

Tommaso Nencetti was born and raised in Florence, Italy. In the cradle of the Renaissance, he developed a passion for languages and pursued his interests for Italian, English, Spanish, and French at the *Volta Language School* in Florence, where he excelled all the way through his graduation in 2007. He expanded his knowledge and teaching skills with further courses in Florence and a two-year experience in the UK. Keen on languages, geography, history, music, fashion, and sports, Tommaso continues his now 10-year teaching career in Seattle where he relocated in 2015, sharing the passion and appreciation for culture, background, and heritage of each language.



The Program:

Since 1984, the local chapter of Dante Alighieri Society has offered a comprehensive Italian Language Program for all those interested in learning or perfecting their Italian language skills. Our instructors are qualified and native speakers, classes are small, and our per hour instruction cost provides good value.

Schedule:

The school year extends from late September or early October to June with a class break every 10 weeks. Classes are held on the Seattle University campus in the Administration Building and meet twice a week on Tuesday and Thursday evenings except the new class "Intermediate-Advanced Conversational Italian" that meets Monday & Wednesdays.

Italian Language Program 2017-2018:

Beginning Italian Level A1 - This course is for people with little or no Italian language. Students will learn basic phonetic, grammatical, and lexical structures through conversation and simple dialogues. Students will be engaged in a variety of fun activities as they begin their journey of learning Italian.

Elementary Italian Level A2 - This course is for those who have already studied some Italian. Students will finish exploring essential grammar structures while learning appropriate and useful words and expressions. By the conclusion of Level A2, students will be able to use basic structures of the language with confidence and be able to communicate well in daily situations.

Intermediate Level B1 - This course will review and reinforce the basic knowledge of Italian while increasing vocabulary and the ability to understand written and spoken language. Students will be exposed to cultural and literary readings which builds greater understanding of Italian culture, lifestyle, and ways of thinking.

Upper Intermediate Level B2 - This course builds on the foundation of B1. It enables students to read and understand newspapers and Internet, song lyrics, literary excerpts, videos, movies, and commercials. At the course conclusion, you will be able to engage effectively in conversations, express opinions, and give simple explanations.

Intermediate—Advanced Conversational Italian—NEW - This is a multi- **Deliver**level conversational course open to students who have completed A2, and recommended for those with a level of proficiency above B1. The course will advance your fluency, listening comprehension, and conversation skills, expand your vocabulary and improve your grammar.

The Dante Alighieri Society of Washington is one of the few institutes in North America authorized to offer PLIDA (Progetto Lingua Italiana Dante Alighieri-Dante Alighieri Italian Language Project)

certification.

Planning to study at an Italian University? Do you need to demonstrate your proficiency in Italian for a job or an extended stay in Italy? Or do you want a certificate to recognize your accomplishment in learning Italian? Then, our PLIDA exam may be just the thing for you. PLIDA is widely recognized as a qualification of proficiency in the Italian language for foreigners in Italy to study, work, and live.

DAS Seattle and its Language Program is an official examination center of the *Società Dante Alighieri*—enabling students and others to take exams leading to a PLIDA certificate.

PLIDA exams are designed by the Società Dante Alighieri staff to assess Italian as a foreign or second language.

Every year thousands of candidate throughout the world test their language competence and get a certificate recognized by the Italian government and accepted globally.

What is PLIDA?

Società Dante Alighieri promotes best practices in teaching Italian as a foreign and second language and has a full range of resources to practice Italian and get ready for the PLIDA exam; SDA provides regularly training sessions, refresher courses, and guidance to syllabus design. PLIDA exams are aligned with international standards and the Common European Framework of Reference levels (CEFR).

To Register

PLIDA certificate sessions are held every year in May and November. Candidates choose to take an exam at the level closest to their proficiency. There are no age limits for exam registration. Registration does not require having taken lower level tests. Candidates need to register 30 days in advance of exam date. More info at: danteseattle.org/plida

Why take a PLIDA Exam?

- To request a resident permit for Italy (from level A2).
- To obtain a longer residence permit of Italy (EC residence permit) from level A2.
- To register with Italian University without taking the Italian examination (levels B2, C1, or C2).

The level required depends on the University and type of faculty.

- To obtain exemption from the Italian exam for the bilingual "patentino" in Trentino Alto-Adige.
- To explain your level of Italian more clearly on your curriculum vitae.

Candela: Looking for Someplace to Move in Italy?

Perhaps you've heard, the mayor of the Italian town of Candela wants to bring life back to his town and will pay up to \$2350 for people to move there. Is there a catch? Yes, to be sure you are serious you must rent a house in town for at least a year and be employed, earning a minimum annual salary of \$8800. For single people, you will receive \$940, while couples with no children will receive \$1415. Families of three will receive \$1770 to \$2100 and families of four or more will receive more than \$2350.

Located some two hours outside of Naples in the Puglia district, Candela once had more than 8000 residents in the 1990s but that has since dwindled to 2700 as younger residents moved away in search of job opportunities. So, some Italian municipalities outside of major cities have gotten creative in luring people to live in their cities. Such is the case with Candela where the mayor has made the monetary offer to anyone willing to relocate to the town.

Candela dates back to medieval times but now, there are dozens of dazzling houses with panoramic terraces and ornate balconies that stand empty, waiting to welcome new residents. It is located in the agrarian "breadbasket of Italy" and was once known as "Little Naples" for its bustling city center.

Why move to Candela? Being close to Naples and only an hour away from the beach in Puglia, it has beautiful Baroque buildings, winding streets, rolling hills, quiet forests, and offers a quiet and simple lifestyle with no crowds, no traffic nor smog, easy to move around, and they say crime free for 20 years. The city uses its money to fund festivals, historic costume parties, horseback tours, medieval museums, and more. It is home to Italian sausages, bumper asparagus crops, balls of burrata cheese and bruschetta, and hosts Candela Sagra dell'Orrechietta (festival of orecchiette pasta). It's all you can eat served with game ragu. It also is home to Italy's narrowest alley which is under 14 inches. Candela isn't the only Italian city that has made a similar offer. Bormida in Liguria is one such city. Other cities may or have followed.


