
"Cultura Italiana contemporanea: alcune riflessioni" by Albert Sbragia

Language Program News by Giuseppe Tassone

Italian Language Program Director

The Italian Language Program offers classes in fall, winter, and spring. Classes are held at Seattle University in the Administration Building. Classes below held Tuesday and Thursday from 7:00-8:30 pm.

Classes Offered:

Beginning Italian (Level A1) - For people with little or no Italian language. Students will be introduced to the basic phonetic, grammatical, and lexical structures through conversation and simple dialogues. During the three-quarter course, students will be engaged in a variety of fun activities and begin their journey of learning Italian. (\$180 per quarter)

Elementary Italian (Level A2) - This is the continuation of the beginning class or for those who have already studied some Italian. Students will finish exploring essential grammar structures while learning appropriate and relevant words and expressions. At the end of the three-quarter course, students should be able to use basic structures of the language with confidence and be able to communicate well in daily situations. (\$180 per quarter)

Intermediate Level (B1) - B1 reviews and reinforces the basic knowledge of Italian. Students will review, expand, and reinforce their knowledge of the language in addition expanding vocabulary and the ability to understand written and spoken Italian. Students will be exposed to cultural and literary readings and will develop a greater understanding of Italian culture, lifestyle, and way of thinking. (\$275 per quarter)

Upper-Intermediate Level (B2) - B2 is a continuation of B1. It completes the review and reinforcement of grammar covered in previous levels in addition covering any missing structures. This course covers understanding articles from newspapers and the web, song lyrics, literary excerpts, videos, and excerpts from films and commercials. At the end of the three-quarter course, students will be able to engage effectively in a conversation, express opinions, and give simple explanations. (\$275 per quarter)

Advanced-Intermediate Level (C1) - This course is designed for students who have completed the grammar topics reviewed and expanded in level B1 and B2 or have a good grasp of them. Students will perfect their grammar and greatly improve their comprehension, conversation, and writing skills. Students will read and discuss literature, watch films and videos in Italian and converse about the cinema, art, Italian news, and current events. At the end of the three-quarter course, one will be able to interact with Italian speakers fluently and spontaneously. (\$300 per quarter)

PLIDA

PLIDA (Progetto Lingua Italiana Dante Alighieri)

The Dante Alighieri Society of Washington in Seattle is an official examination center of the Società Dante Alighieri and provides its students and others the opportunity of taking PLIDA exams in order to obtain a PLIDA certificate.

The PLIDA Certificate

The PLIDA certificate is an official Diploma issued by the Società Dante Alighieri under an agreement with the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the University of Rome *La Sapienza*. It is recognized by the Italian Ministry of Labour and Social Policies and by the Italian Ministry of University and Research as a qualification for the proficiency in the Italian language for foreigners.

The PLIDA certificates attest proficiency in Italian as a foreign language on a 6-level scale according to the parameters established by the Common European Framework for Languages (A1, A2, B1, B2, C1, C2).

Why Take the PLIDA Exam

Students who may wish to be certified include those who plan to study at Italian universities (which accepts PLIDA Certification as proof of proficiency), American high school and college students who may seek college credit, or persons wishing to be certified for obtaining an application for the Italian Permit of Stay in Italy. Certification may also interest students who see the examination as a capstone experience after taking their language courses.

Dates, Registration, Location, and Exam Fees

PLIDA certificate sessions will be held every year in May and November. Candidates may choose to take an exam at the level they feel is closest to their proficiency. Registration does not require having taken lower-level tests.

Candidates need to register approximately 30 days prior to the exam date. Dates of each exam, registration deadlines, location, exam fees, and registration instructions check the Language School's Plida website at:

Local School Turns Retirement into a Golden Age of Learning

There's a nomadic "schoolhouse" in Seattle that has moved twice in the past ten years and four times since 1981. Yet no matter where the faculty of over 20 teachers lands, students keep coming from all over town.

Lifetime Learning Center (LLC) offers inexpensive courses 'for older adults' and, because students aren't working for degrees and professional careers, the faculty can offer classes on everything from ancient Egypt, Shakespeare and current politics to Beginning Bridge, Quilt Making and the music of Gilbert and Sullivan.

Paneen Davidson has been driving to LLC classes from Mercer Island since 2010. "There's nothing like it for the diversity and depth of classes," she says. "This year I'm taking a class on Evolution for three quarters. It's a complicated topic but it's fascinating. A few years ago I spent three-quarters on the composer **Verdi** taught by Theodore Deacon. I was never an opera fan but he's a great teacher and now I'm hooked, I've become a regular opera-goer."

This fall, 363 students are taking weekly classes in the new schoolhouse, the Lake City Presbyterian Church, a block from Sand Point Way at NE 123rd. The powerful draw of the LLC for both students and teachers is a shared desire for a deeper knowledge of the world and themselves. The fact that this quest brings new friends is a bonus for many students.

Mike Boler and his wife Carolyn drive to LLC's Lake City classrooms from Mukilteo. "My wife took a class and I saw the syllabus and said, "Wow! and decided to take time for all the things I had always wanted to do. I've been taking piano lessons at LLC every quarter for four years. It's the fulfillment of a dream I've had since childhood. Last year I took the class on Joyce's *Ulysses*. I had tried to read it myself several times but it was just too difficult. In class, we all struggled with it but the group process of sharing that book grew into a major revelation about how we all handle our lives. That's another thing about these classes," Boler says, "when you've worked through a challenging subject like that in a group, you get a feeling of cohesion with your classmates. I've made friendships here that have enriched my life."

Health benefits for a maturing population

A recent article in the journal *Neurology* may explain the growing popularity of non-credit courses for senior citizens. Summarizing recent experiments, the article says, "Dementia affects a staggering proportion of individuals, imposing a huge cost to our society. There are currently no disease modifying treatments for dementia, making lifestyle factors that influence dementia risk of utmost importance. One such lifestyle factor that has shown promise in delaying dementia onset is engagement in cognitively stimulating activities, such as reading, writing, and playing games." (Neurology, July, 2013).

At 95 years of age, Jean Arons has been attending LLC's literature classes for 11 years. "We can study as little or as much as we want," she says, "but I find that getting knowledge is a great pleasure in itself."

A unique faculty

Students say the secret of the LLC success is the teachers – all of them volunteers. Many say they didn't want to retire after a lifetime of teaching in traditional colleges and universities. At LLC they can continue to explore their field of knowledge or pursue a new one without dealing with tests and grades. Their classrooms are full of students who want to explore too, enrolling in classes on the history of Japan, watercolor painting, creative writing and Yoga.

While there are other learning centers for older adults in the region, LLC is the only one not affiliated with a college or senior center using paid teachers. LLC is a non-profit organization run by a part-time staff of two, assisted by a board of directors made up of volunteers from the student body. Office manager Edla Deppman says finding high quality, volunteer teachers has been surprisingly easy. "People recommend them to us or some have just found us and some have been teaching here for 20 years."

For Theodore Deacon, a former university music professor, there are multiple benefits. "I like just going in and lecturing and not having to deal with all the politics of a university. I try to teach at LLC at the same level of my university classes. I talk not just about the stories of the operas, but the history, politics and symbolism of the works. I have a great time with this body of students, they are eager to be here and use their minds. It's an instant reward for me – that I have done something important for people I consider friends as well as students." There have been up to 80 students in some of Deacon's classes on music and composers.

Learning on a two-way street

Every seat was filled in Michael Shurgot's class on Shakespeare's *Richard II*. Student volunteers read passages from the play and Shurgot fills in the historical context of political problems and power struggles in late 14th century Britain. A brief mention of the parallels in modern politics sets all heads nodding in agreement and raises a number of student comments.

"So often the students teach me," Shurgot says. "We were doing a class on Macbeth and two of the students were professional psychologists. They brought up theories about psychopaths who are often articulate but severely troubled. One remarked that, "Nowhere in this play does Macbeth sleep and when people don't sleep, they become subject to delusions." That observation gave us a whole new way to see the visions and ghosts in the play."

All the volunteer teachers at LLC have similar stories. "What often surprises me is the wealth of knowledge and experience in the students," says Marianne LoGerfo, who has taught dozens of classes on ancient civilizations. "In a class where we were reading *Gilgamesh*, the earliest known example of written storytelling, a couple brought a tin of cookies to class. I was a little worried that passing the cookies around would take time out of the class discussion. But when they opened the tin box, it was full of small artifacts engraved in early cuneiform writing. We were all thrilled to see and touch these ancient pieces from so long ago."

LLC bills itself as "courses for older adults" and most of the students are at retirement age, but there is no age restriction. Dennis Noson, a practicing acoustical engineer, has taken classes for eight years.

"They have classes on things that I never got enough of when I was in engineering school. Now I've studied Dante and Beowulf and ancient Greece. Class here is different from college classes, it's more like a seminar than a lecture. Discussion is encouraged and we often take turns reading plays and books aloud. In a class on the Greek tragedies, I was able to add something about how the acoustics worked in the ancient theaters."

Bobbie Simone brings 32 years of university teaching experience to her literature and film classes. "Poetry and plays are meant to be heard, not read," she says. Inviting students to read texts aloud is a regular part of her approach to classics that have included **Bocaccio's Decameron**, Gulliver's Travels, Homer, Virgil's Aeneid, **Dante's Divine Comedy** and the plays of Shakespeare. Class discussion is also a part of her film series classes that are often organized around themes that unite films from varied times and countries.

From the dawn of time to the current news

Bill Taylor taught political science and history in Chicago for 32 years before coming to Seattle and joining the LLC faculty. He recently taught a course on Islam and the West, tracing the earliest teachings of Islam through centuries of change, culminating in the rise of salafist and jihadist movements in modern Egypt and Iran. Just as the quarter ended, the crisis of the Muslim Brotherhood erupted in Egypt and continues to threaten the stability of the Middle East. Taylor's students may not be able to predict the future there, but now they can easily explain the past.

Taylor says, "Younger adults in class settings are often passive but older people want to discuss. Often they have pursued professional careers that left no time for exploring other sides of life. Here, people come because they want to learn and almost all the teachers are dedicated to providing a large arena for discussion. That makes studying here something like a big family. You can see it in the lounge between classes, people are making friends through the subjects they're studying. It combines intellectual curiosity with a social experience — it's perfect."

LLC classes run for eight weeks through the school year and four weeks in the Summer. Each quarter, students pay a registration fee of \$15 plus \$30 for each class. Five scholarships are offered each quarter for people who might not otherwise be able to enroll. The LLC Fall Quarter is scheduled from September 29 to November 20.

If you want a lecture class which provides mostly historical and biographical background, look elsewhere. This will be a class in which everyone participates in a reading and discussion. The aim is to understand and appreciate a great work of art through sharing. If you are classicalphobic, fear not: we make the classics not only accessible but enjoyable.


