2021-AnnoDantesco Some Online Events to Enjoy by Dan DeMatteis

2021 is being celebrated as *Anno Dantesco* by the Italians throughout Italy. It marks the 700th anniversary of the death of their national poet, Dante Alighieri, in 1321. Museums in Italy have planned special exhibits. Schoolteachers are encouraged to highlight Dante in their lessons. New art, videos, musical events and dramatic readings from Dante's works, especially from his monumental *La Divina Commedia*, are planned all over Italy as part of what's called DanteMania.

The excitement started unofficially back in 2015, the year which marked the 750th anniversary of the birth of Dante in 1265. It received official status when in 2020 the Italian Parliament proclaimed March 25, the day in 1300 when Dante began his journey to the underworld in Canto I, as Dantedì. When COVID threw a monkey-wrench into plans for the first Dantedì on March 25, 2020 and Italy was under a severe lockdown, everyone in Italy was invited to read the beginning of the *Divine Comedy* from their windows at 6 P.M. on March 25 instead. An invitation which reportedly the Italians took up with their usual enthusiasm for public celebrations.

Florence, where Dante was born and grew up, and Ravenna, where he

died in exile, have organized multiple events, most virtual but with a few live performances and exhibits.

Florence has over 100 *Anno Dantesco* events planned, according to the Italian press. The most concrete and perhaps lasting of these is a new Museo della Lingua Italiana (https://youtu.be/SahNguDYWuc) with construction to begin in 2021 and completion scheduled for 2023. There are art exhibits to be held in the Uffizi, the Bargello, the Opera di Santa Croce and the Museo Galileo. The Casa di Dante, on the site in Florence where Dante lived growing up, has launched a virtual tour for its contribution: <u>Tour virtuale del museo - Casa di Dante, Firenze</u>

Perhaps the most original and public event is found in Ravenna. During the Christmas season 2020 and continuing through 2021, the city has put up in lights in the *centro storico* on six of its streets fifteen quotations from Dante's *Commedia*. As the official Ravenna tourism website says," this project outlines a bright path through the porticoes and buildings of the city: it is a real homage to the Father of the Italian language and - at the same time - it wants to be a message of hope, wishing that soon we will "see once more the stars" (Inferno XXXIV, 139)." La Luce delle Parole (vista.it)

Our headquarter organization in Rome, *Società Dante Alighieri (SDA)*, is sponsoring many *Anno Dantesco* events and projects as well. One of the most intriguing is a series of one hundred 12 minute films, one for each canto of the *Commedia.* The collection is part of a larger project called *In Viaggio con Dante*. You can see a couple of examples on their website at <u>Montagna Infinita</u> (dantemania.it)

Another original SDA project is a short film available on YouTube called "*L'Italia di Dante - Viaggio nel Paese della 'Commedia*". In the video Prof. Giuilo Ferroni, who narrates the film, visits some of the places visited by the Dante or mentioned in the *Commedia*. I hope you enjoy exploring some of these *Anno Dantesco* events available on the internet. And I hope you'll be there for both of Dante Seattle's March meetings, on March 10 and 24, to enjoy our own Dante celebrations. *Eviva Dante*!

Italian Language Program News

Our language program is now approaching the end of winter quarter and our students are completing their second quarter of level A1, A2, B1 and B2. Students in the beginning level A1 began in the fall by studying the Italian alphabet, phonetics, cognates and numbers. At the end of the quarter, they accomplished the goal of being able to introduce themselves, greet others, using the appropriate level of formality, express how they are feeling and describe themselves and other by age and origins. They learned how to give personal information, talk about likes and dislikes and leisure time. In their second quarter they learned how to order a snack at a restaurant, make plans for specific days of the week and times of a day, express preferences and talk about where they and others are going. They also learned in more detail how to describe past action and events and then, after spring break, attend another 30 hours of Italian to complete their first level.

If students in level A1 began with no knowledge of Italian, students in level A2 were mostly continuing students from the school year 2019-20 and at the end of spring quarter will reach a proficiency in Italian that allows them to begin the low-intermediate level B1 in the fall of 2021. Independently, from the level that they attend, in addition to a solid grammar foundation and reinforcement in level B1 and B2, we strive to build useful communication skills in our students.

We are proud of their commitment and accomplishments and we are very excited for the upcoming English meeting where students from all levels will present a class project related to Dante Alighieri on the occasion of the Dante 2021 and the 700th anniversary of the death of Dante Alighieri. We are now in the process of refining their projects in coordination with their instructors Laura Ciroi, Nicla Riverso, Francesca Giambartolomei, Damiano Pinton, Paola Alberti and Roberta Punzi. We will be ready to present them to members and the general public on Wednesday, March 10th at 7:30.

To conclude just a reminder that registration deadline for spring quarter is scheduled for March 20th and the first day of class is March 30th. As with the previous quarters, classes will be conducted online. Visit our website for more information and to register.
